It is a cross-value chain collaboration supporting the role of fibre-based packaging in a circular economy, contributing to a climate neutral and sustainable society. 4evergreen currently has over	The goal of 4evergreen is to raise the overall recycling rate of fibre-based packaging to 90% by 2030 (currently 82.5%) by focusing on the packaging types that currently have a low recycling rate, in particular household and on-the-go food packaging. Mondi is represented in all four technical workstreams, which focus on how to evaluate recyclability tests, how to design for circularity, best practices for improved collection and sorting, and innovation. Mondi also participates in the communication and advocacy workstream and in the Strategy Taskforce 4.0, working to develop recommendations related to innovation, data management and governance of the alliance post 2024.

		- Publication of the second version of the 'Circularity By Design' guideline for fibre-based packaging and an updated Guidance Document on Collection and Sorting

AIM (the European Brands Association)	AIM is the European Brands Association representing brand manufacturers in Europe on key issues which affect their ability to design, distribute and market their brands.	In 2021, AIM launched HolyGrail 2.0 with Mondi and over 85 other partners across the value chain. Our goal is to assess whether pioneering digital watermarking technology can enable better sorting and higher-quality recycling rates for packaging in the EU. Digital watermarks have the potential to revolutionise the way we sort and recycle waste, increasing the commercial value of waste so that it can be reused again as a resource. Mondi is a supporting member and we are monitoring developments.
Alliance for Water Stewardship (AWS)	AWS is a global membership collaboration comprising businesses, NGOs and the public sector. AWS members contribute to the sustainability of local water resources through their adoption and promotion of a universal framework for the sustainable use of water – the International Water Stewardship Standard, or AWS Standard – that drives, recognises and rewards good water stewardship performance.	Mondi joined the global AWS in 2020. We have worked with AWS to develop a Group Water Stewardship Standard that is designed to set out how mills will use operation- and catchment-based information to determine a contextually appropriate level of water stewardship response. This work was guided by the current version of the AWS Standard and considers each mill's exposure to water-related risks. To date, we have assessed 54% of our mills and forestry organisations.
CDP	CDP is a corporate transparency initiative. It plays an important role in disclosing high-quality, comparable data on Group environmental performance to investors. Confederation of European Paper Industries (Cepi)	Mondi is a member of Cepi, a Brussels-based, pan- European association that represents the interests of the forest fibre and paper industry. Through its 18 national associations, Cepi speaks on behalf of around 490 companies operating 885 pulp and paper mills across Europe producing paper, cardboard, pulp and other bio-based products.	Mondi's CEO is a Cepi Board member and other Mondi experts engage in multiple committees, issue groups and other taskforce initiatives, including the Product Policy Issue Group, the Environmental Committee, the Trade Network, the Forest Committee, the GHG Protocol Mirror Group, the Certification Network and the EU Deforestation Implementation Taskforce. We support the forest sector view in favour of continued active use of the European forests by implementing integrated forest management approaches, rather than setting more land aside for conservation. We continue to support Cepi's call for the EU to place the 'cascading use of wood' principle at the core of its climate and energy policy to promote the most efficient use of the available biomass resource. We also continue to promote the complementary nature of fresh and recycled fibre. In 2023, through our membership in Cepi, we: - supported engagement on the Packaging and Packaging Waste Regulation; - received briefing notes and updates on various EU dossiers; - organised an industry/policy conference where Mondi representatives participated as panellist speakers; - engaged with Cepi about issues around the practical implementation of the GHG Protocol's Land Sector and Removals Guidance (LSRG) and the Science Based Targets initiative's (SBTi's) Forest, Land and Agriculture (FLAG) tool; and - took active part in the work of the EUDR Implementation Task Force.

It enables the professional paper buyer to make well-informed product choices.	Mondi is a member of the Paper Profile steering committee. Mondi is also a member of the technical working group, which is helping to generate and improve a standardised description of paper product characteristics. Mondi provides Paper Profiles for relevant products upon customer request.
Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi)	The Science Based Targets initiative (SBTi) is a partnership between CDP, the United Nations Global Compact, the World Resources Institute (WRI) and the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF). The SBTi defines and promotes best practice in emissions reductions and net-zero targets in line with climate science, and provides technical assistance and expert resources to companies which set science-based targets in line with the latest climate science.	Mondi's near- and long-term Net-Zero science-based GHG reduction targets are in line with a 1.5°C scenario. We are updating our Net-zero targets by recalculating our 2019 baseline greenhouse gas emissions to reflect our continuing operations, to reflect disposal of our Russian operations and include acquisitions made since 2019. We will submit our revised Net-Zero targets to SBTi for validation in 2024.

The Ellen MacArthur Foundation	The Ellen MacArthur Foundation (EMF) works with business, government and academia to accelerate the transition to the circular economy. Since its creation, the charity has emerged as a global thought leader, establishing the circular economy on the agenda of decision-makers globally. The EMF, in collaboration with the UN Environment Programme, leads the Global Commitment, which commits signatories to achieve 100% of plastic packaging to be reusable, recyclable, or compostable by 2025.	Mondi is a member of the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, which brings together leading businesses and experts to rethink and redesign the future of plastics, starting with packaging. Mondi is a signatory of the Global Commitment, alongside large brands, retailers, packaging manufacturers, governments and other stakeholders. The threshold used by the Ellen MacArthur Foundation to prove recycling or composting works 'in practice and at scale' is a 30% recycling/composting rate achieved across multiple regions, collectively representing at least 400 million inhabitants. By this definition, Mondi's flexible plastic-based products are not yet deemed recyclable at scale. However, in 2023, we reported 29% (2022: 31%) of our plastic packaging, based on weight, as designed for recycling, based on the CEFLEX guideline. For examples of our projects in place to achieve this target, please see page 30. In 2022, we joined the Business Coalition for a Global Plastics Treaty, led by the Ellen MacArthur Foundation and WWF, which endorses a common vision for an internationally legal binding instrument to end plastic pollution. Changing climatic conditions across Southern Africa have increased biotic and abiotic stress on our trees and, as a consequence, exacerbated pest and disease occurrence in our plantation forests. We are continuing with our tree protection partnership with the University of Pretoria through sponsorship of the Mondi and Forests and Agriculture Biotechnology Institute (FABI) Research Grant. Our ongoing participation in the Tree Protection Co-operative Programme (TPCP) at the University of Pretoria as part of FABI has assisted us in developing practical measures to manage the Sirex and Leptocybe wasps, and other pathogenic diseases, which damage pine and eucalyptus plantations respectively. This work also feeds into our tree improvement programme and enables, through genomic marker selection, the selection of more resistant trees for our plantation forests.
